**ARIZONA AUTOMOBILE THEFT AUTHORITY ANNOUNCES 2003/2004  
GRANT AWARD RECIPIENTS**

**PHOENIX** (May 8, 2003) The Arizona Automobile Theft Authority (AATA) issued over \$897,000 in grant funding to thirty-two (32) criminal justice agencies throughout Arizona for fiscal year 2003/2004.

The AATA finalized its 2003/2004 Vertical Prosecution, Law Enforcement, Public Awareness, and Professional Training grant programs with funding going out to statewide criminal justice agencies. The AATA's Law Enforcement grant awards are intended to promote more efficient and effective law enforcement within jurisdictions for vehicle theft deterrence, enforcement and investigation. The Public Awareness grants are intended to educate the community on ways to protect their vehicles from being stolen, while also promoting a "layered approach" to protection and the Authority's free, "Watch Your Car" program.

The agencies receiving funding this year include Casa Grande Police Department, Chandler Police Department, Cochise County Sheriff's Office, Coolidge Police Department, Flagstaff Police Department, Florence Police Department, Gilbert Police Department, Glendale Police Department, Kingman Police Department, Maricopa County Attorney's Office, Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, Mesa Police Department, Peoria Police Department, Phoenix Police Department, Pima County Attorney's Office, Pinal County Attorney's Office, Pinal County Sheriff's Office, Pinal County Sheriff's Office, Prescott Valley/Prescott Police Departments, Santa Cruz County Sheriff's Office, Scottsdale Police Department, Surprise Police Department, Tempe Police Department, Tucson Police Department, Yavapai County Sheriff's Office, Yuma County Sheriff's Office, Yuma Police Department, and the Arizona Vehicle Theft Task Force.

Several of this years grant agencies include rural communities in Arizona that the AATA has not issued prior funding to. AATA Executive Director, Mr. Mikel Longman states, "The AATA is excited about the opportunity to provide additional funding to its statewide community partners to further their enforcement, investigation and public awareness and community education efforts."

The AATA Vertical Prosecution grants are issued to county attorney offices throughout Arizona to fund dedicated, specially trained deputy county attorneys to address all phases of the criminal justice process regarding vehicle theft, and associated crimes. The counties currently receiving funding include Cochise, Maricopa, Mohave, Pima, Pinal, and Santa Cruz.

The 2003/2004 Law Enforcement grant agencies will be receiving funding for officer overtime, investigative support, equipment/tools, and communications and technology to purchase tracking systems for “bait” vehicles.

The 2003/2004 Public Awareness grant agencies will be receiving funding for officer overtime, Vehicle Identification Number (VIN) etching equipment and supplies, and promotional/advertising items. The participating agencies will be conducting events within their communities, featuring free VIN etching and educating the public on methods of vehicle theft prevention which include the following:

- Lock it or lose it - Always lock your vehicles and take the keys with you.
- Never leave your vehicle running and unattended.
- Use of visual theft deterrent devices such as steering wheel locks, brake locks, ignition column devices, vehicle identification number (VIN) etching on windows, tracking systems, and electronic car alarms.

These devices will discourage thieves and/or increase their chances of being caught.
